Gardening Group by Lorraine

The Gardening Group have continued to maintain and improve the flower beds and tubs around the village. Steve has, as ever, done amazing work maintaining the beds at the top of Dene Terrace and Walbottle Road by the bungalows, as well as making a huge effort to improve the previously neglected area known as the "shady triangle" just above Walbottle House. Steve has also painted benches on The Green and the planter outside the Walbottle Coffee House. He has done all this in addition to doing lots of general weeding and watering of tubs and beds. Samantha has kindly adopted the beds and tubs by the bus stop on the chapel side of Walbottle Road and is keeping these weed free and watered. The Coffee shop have agreed to water the planter up there once it has been planted up. The rose beds on Percy Way are also doing well. Recently a group including Vitalii planted out more dahlias around the roses in the upper two beds to match the lower one.

The bed outside St Cuthberts school is looking lovely and the plants are now well established. The bed at the bottom of the green has proven very successful. In good part this is thanks to the help and advice from Cowells, namely to choose well matched perennial plants rather than using higher maintenance annuals.

The Jubilee bed courtesy of Nick and Sacha looked amazing for our jubilee celebrations. We have a few perennial plants in this bed but it is mainly annuals. This was necessitated by the brief - red white and blue by Jubilee day! But we will endeavour to plant more perennials in the autumn to make the maintenance of this bed easier.

We are looking for people to adopt all the beds mentioned above to look after weeding, watering and planting. Please let us know if you can help?

Next we hope to make more progress in the shady triangle by planting shade loving perennials and updating the central rockery to be similar to that outside St Cuthberts school. Work has commenced to eliminate the weeds but this project could do with a "crash team" to get together, dig it over and prepare it for planting.

Defibrillator by Shirley

In late 2021 a number of Residents asked about the possibility of us acquiring a defibrillator to be housed in a prominent position in the Village. At that time we tried various ways and means to gain funding to provide what we saw as an important piece of lifesaving equipment. After lots of refusals from different philanthropists we sent an application to the Newcastle Community Fund who forwarded it to The Willan Fund. It took a good few months to process the application as we had just missed the deadline for the previous quarter. But then the phone call came to say they had accepted our application and not only would supply the defibrillator but pay for the cabinet and installation. Therefore to the present...... I am positive that no one can miss the very brightly coloured yellow and green cabinet sitting on the external wall of the porch at the Walbottle Village Institute. I am glad to say the Village now owns a state of the Art Fully Automated Defibrillator. It was purchased from the North East Ambulance Service who helped us decide which one would be best for everyone. It was decided that we would have a fully automated device that actually talks you through the whole procedure so it is very straightforward. Our first training session is planned for the 17th of August in the Institute when we hope to train up to 25 local residents in its use. The Walbottle Hoard by Roger

Did you know, that in 1879 a workman digging under Hexham road during construction of the water storage tanks and filter beds in west Throckley found an earthenware pot filled with Roman coins? The pot had been buried alongside Hadrian's wall probably no later than 274AD by a Roman soldier who never returned to collect his treasure. The contents of the pot numbered over 5000 radiate (silvered-bronze or "billion") coins and may have had a value of half a year's salary.



Why the soldier didn't return is a mystery but at the time the Roman empire was in turmoil with several provincial governors vying for the position of Emperor. The hoard may have belonged to a soldier in the army of Tetricus 1 that was defeated by Aurelian at Chalons-Sur-Marne in 274AD. But what happened to the Walbottle Hoard? The workman attempted to sell the coins privately but when word reached John Clayton he purchased the pot and remaining coins. Over the years the coins have been separated but the Clayton Collection trustees saved 1977 coins which are now in Chesters museum while another 932 coins are in the safe keeping of the Society of Antiquaries of Newcastle Upon Tyne (SANT). It is interesting to speculate what else is waiting to be discovered under Hexham Road!

Operation Source - An Update by Roger

In the last newsletter we printed an article about Tom John Nelson from Walbottle who crewed the midget submarine X5 which attacked the Tirpitz moored in Kafjord fjord. The X5 was destroyed during the attack and Tom never came home. We recently received an email from Tom's nephew who provided more information about Tom and his only sibling Ruby. Ruby Nelson married Robert Simpson and had a son Ralph. Ralph told us that his mother and father died in 2018 within four days of each other and had their ashes scattered on Kafjord fjord close to where the X5 is believed to have sunk. Tom's uniform was also donated to the Kafjord Tirpitz museum. The following address will take you to the museum http://www.tirpitz-museum.no
