#### **Update from WVT&RA Committee**

Since the last newsletter there have been two open meetings in the Village Institute. The first was held on the  $2^{nd}$  of May when the West Denton Fire Station manger Mr Ian Stewart provided a very detailed debrief on last Summer's wildfire. The debrief included a question and answer session where notes were taken and uploaded onto Facebook and onto the website under News.



The second meeting was held on the 13<sup>th</sup> of June in the village Institute and was both an open meeting for all residents followed by a closed WVT&RA committee meeting. The meeting was well attended and a briefing by Virgin Media's community lead officer Ms Jane Proctor was well received. Ms Proctor took questions from the floor and these were recorded by the secretary and included in the minutes of the meeting. The minutes are on Facebook and on the website under News.

This was the first time the WVT&RA have held both an open and closed meeting consecutively and its success will be a model for future meetings. The next planned meeting of the WVT&RA is the AGM on Tuesday the 15 of August 2023 at 7pm in the Village Institute. All Walbottle Village

residents are encouraged to attend to vote in existing and new committee officers. This newsletter includes a separate sheet detailing job descriptions for two new officer roles; IT support and Communications. If you think one of these roles could be for you then please get in touch.

#### Gardening group

We continue to try and keep the village looking jolly with our plantings. We have updated the raised bed in front of Head to Toe. The bed has been planted up with perennial alpines and low growing plants that we hope will establish themselves over the next year. The bed has been top dressed with alpine grit to suppress weeds. We will add some small bulbs in the Autumn to hopefully add a splash of colour all year round. Thank you Head to Toe for adopting this bed and looking after watering.

As reported in our last newsletter the 2 sets of 3 planters by the entrance to Walbottle Farm have been removed. 3 planters have been reinstated next to the village institute and planted up with herbs and lavender. Once the herbs are established villagers are welcome to pick herbs for cooking.

The Percy Way Rose Beds are now well established and have been maintained by Kelly and Samantha. The Coronation and Jubilee beds are now established and add a pop of colour to the village green. The 'Shady Triangle' remains a challenge although some plants are now established and flowering on the north wall. More work is required however with the extremely dry spell we did not think it was a good idea to try and establish new plants. The tubs at the village green bus stops have been replanted as well as a tidy up of perennials around the bus shelter. We hope to re-plant and tidy the area by the coal truck by the entrance to the paddock as well as establish a crocus lawn for next spring. We are always looking for volunteers for one off projects or general weeding and planting. We do try to have group sessions to do this which is much more fun than doing it solo and a good opportunity to get to know everyone. Walbottle Village is now officially a <u>NO COLD CALLING</u> zone and any unsolicited traders who knock at your door may be committing a criminal offence and should be reported to tradingstandards@newcastle.gov.uk or the police if they are intimidating. Expect to receive a consultation letter with notification when the zone was implemented along with a window sticker in the near future.




#### **Past and Present Residents**

It sounds like Brian had a very interesting life. He left Walbottle at the age of 18 and joined the Army. After leaving the Army he lived in France, Kuwait, Maurtius, Kenya, Uganda and Romania then went to Florida where he trained dogs for the police department. He now lives in Wisbech, Cambridgeshire and has only returned to Walbottle about 4 times. His aunt Doreen lived at number 11 Percy Way then moved to one of the bungalows until her recent death.

### Willie of the Woods - A Local Legend

Did you know that in the 1750's a Scotsman by the name of William Pettigrew came to Walbottle looking for work and got a job as a coal waggon driver in Walbottle colliery. Unfortunately he couldn't find anywhere to live so he built his own house from sods of earth and brushwood in Walbottle and Throckley Dene not far from the Military road (Hexham road). Four stakes were driven into the ground and a couple of planks served as a table while old coal buckets or 'corves' filled with straw formed a bed. He married and raised children in this humble abode but when word got out that there was a family living in the Dene people flocked to see him naming him 'Willie of the Woods'. In fact he became such a celebrity that the number of visitors became troublesome but being an enterprising sort of chap he bought cheese, ale and bread which he sold to the visitors at a profit. In this way he was able to provide a better standard of living than would have been possible on a mere waggon driver's wage. From humble beginnings two of his children did quite well. One became a lieutenant in the army while another acquired some celebrity as a Methodist preacher!


